Since 1995, there have been 37 OPI graduates; since 2007, there have been 45 PPP graduates; and since 2000, there have been 8,126 attendees of our Continuing Education Programs. Throughout all OPC programs, much creative and committed work is occurring to improve educational programs and outreach by OPC's passionate and dedicated volunteer faculty members. I want to express my gratitude to all our faculty, students, and members for your participation and contributions. Also, much recognition and praise are due to our administrative staff who manage an overwhelming number of details to keep OPC running smoothly and growing.

Message from Oregon Psychoanalytic Institute (OPI) Director

As I approach the end of my tenure as Director of OPI, I find myself reflecting on the last four years and where we are. When I began my directorship on July I, 2020, we were in the throes of a pandemic that began in late 2019, and by March 2020, most therapists and analysts had closed their offices to in-person work and transitioned their practices to a virtual setting, whether online or via telephone. Both analyst and patient were experiencing the same external threat, and this reality had to have an unforeseen impact on the work. Conducting analysis and psychotherapy online was an experiment, and we weren't sure how it would change the work although we knew it would. We were amazed and grateful that we could continue to help our patients. The Institute suspended all in-person meetings and classes and Zoom meetings became the norm. The extent and nature of the threat still eluded us, and we were vigilant about wearing masks, keeping six feet apart, and meeting outdoors. It was a time of high anxiety and uncertainty about the future. After being Curriculum Chair with its unique demands, I had naively thought that being Director shouldn't be that challenging. I was wrong.

Shepherding us through the pandemic was a joint effort where everyone joined forces to meet the demands of the day. Our **Executive Director, Lindsey Stevens,** got us up and running on Zoom and provided the support we needed to function and carry out our mission. We persevered and continued with our teaching, supervision, committee work, and work with patients. As vaccines became available and the pandemic began to wane, we slowly began a return to in-person classes, committee meetings, and patient work. During the four years that I've been Director, a new OPI class began the program and are now finishing their second year of candidacy. Eight candidates have graduated and we have welcomed seven of them as new associate faculty. We are looking forward to beginning a new class in Fall 2025. Candidate **Sarah Baird, PsyD**, will be graduating this spring. Congratulations, Sarah!

We began holding community meetings with faculty and candidates together to process the strains that arose during the pandemic. After the American Psychoanalytic Association revised its training standards and we were emerging from the bubble of collective isolation, we began to have searching conversations about our own identity, values, and what kind of an Institute we wanted to be. We started discussing and re-evaluating our policies related to training and progression. We worked on a mission statement and proposed changes to enhance and strengthen our educational program.

The Executive Committee is composed of the Chairs of all OPC committees, as well as two faculty representatives and often a candidate representative. I could not have been effective in this position without them. Winston Anderson, PsyD, Sara Gardiner, MD, Cynthia Gray, MD, Betsy Iannuccillo, LCSW, Jeanne Johnson, MD, J. Powers, MD, and Nancy Winters, MD, have worked tirelessly on behalf of the Institute, the faculty, and the candidates. Their devotion to the growth and smooth functioning of the Institute cannot be overstated. A big thank you to candidate representatives, Cindi Palman, MD, and Catherine Blanchard, LPC, and faculty representatives, Duane Dale, MD, and Cody Evans, MD, for their contributions. I am grateful to have had the opportunity to serve as Director of OPI and very appreciative of the growth that it has afforded me. The Institute depends on the volunteer efforts of our faculty. Being involved at any level in the running of this organization is a labor of love. Cynthia Gray, MD, as incoming Director, will be guiding us through the next three years and I am passing the baton to her. I know the Institute is in good hands and I am excited to see what evolves under her leadership.

Working in community has been critical for program development in the area of diversity and social context. Because unconscious dimensions and internalized biases are so challenging, we must do this work collectively. In April, the PPP hosted an all-faculty meeting to explore ways instructors can integrate the sociocultural context of class material, model critical thinking, bring forward explicit and implicit bias, and include articles from diverse writers. In May, we met again for a Syllabus Workshop to discuss elements of course design to address sociocultural context and diverse perspectives. The community of faculty who are engaged in this work is enlivened and energized to keep up these important efforts. I'm particularly grateful to **Brooke Kuhnhausen**, **PhD**, who contributed a great deal of time and love, sharing her own professional, cultural, and psychological perspectives and experiences doing work in the areas of diversity, culture, and social context.

The community of faculty members who volunteer to teach in the PPP are the backbone of the program. They make enormous contributions of their professional skill and creative and thoughtful teaching methods to benefit the experience and learning of our students. Among the many faculty who've taught this spring is Ann Anthony, MD, who is piloting a Student Process Group for the current cohort of students. This group is designed to enhance student learning through the growth of a collective identity.

I'd also like to welcome a few new faculty to the PPP, including **Carrie Atikune**, **PsyD**, **Kara Powers**, **MD**, and **Amy Reiss**, **PhD**, all of whom will teach next year.

The PPP Committee is a dedicated and thoughtful community that supports and organizes every aspect of the program. These kind, hard-working, and diligent members include Tess Keith, OPC Program Administrator, Sandra Krussel, DO, Kerry Opdyke, MD, Kelly Reams, LCSW, BCD, Redmond Reams, PhD, and Michael Weiner, LCSW. Additionally, Stacey Gramann, DO, Jolie Krechman, PhD, and Merrill Weyerhaeuser, PhD, are generous student advisors.

I want to congratulate several people in another important group, the student community. There are 8 students in the current cohort, and one of them, **Rebecca Davis**, **LCSW**, presented at The Creative Arts Therapy conference in Paris this spring about the impacts of racial trauma and potential paths for healing using creative art therapies. (See announcement on page 5). Additionally, two other hard-working professionals will be honored as PPP graduates in June. They are **Brent Belford**, **LCSW**, and **Caroline Redstone-Jones**, **PMHNP**.

Continuing Education (CE)

We've had a very dynamic year in CE, showcasing the diversity of psychoanalytic engagement. On May 4, our closing Special Program "Here, I'm Alive: The Spirit of Music in Psychoanalysis" showcased three authors (**Adam Blum, PsyD, Peter Goldberg, PhD,** and **Michael Levin, PsyD**) who bring the language, body, and metaphor of music to psychoanalysis. Weaving the ideas of Winnicott and Bion with those of the French psychoanalyst Jean Laplanche all through the use of music, these authors presented a framework that is at the leading edge of psychoanalytic thinking while, at the same time, returns us to our existential and humanistic common ground.

Next year, in addition to Fundamentals and Beyond Fundamentals, we are excited to offer courses on film, the work of Christopher Bollas, ethics within psychoanalysis, work with parents and children, and our continuing program on Lost Classics. **Stephen Purcell, MD,** will be offering a bimonthly case conference-style course on impasses in treatment. Check out the CE section of the OPC website in July for next year's offerings!

Growing Community & Psychoanalysis (GCAP)

Aspiring to engage with our social surroundings, OPC's Growing Community & Psychoanalysis (GCAP) program remains dedicated to promoting psychoanalytic ideas in community-based settings. Focusing on group processes, the many functions of communities, and social advocacy, GCAP continues to support the bridging of psychoanalysis and community, both near and far.

In March 2024, OPC & GCAP cosponsored the inaugural, two-day conference on Community Psychoanalysis, held in Washington, DC, for which I was a member of the planning committee. A letter sent to the conference attendees captures the tone of the conference, "The participants' engagement and diverse perspectives were instrumental in acknowledging the often-overlooked work of so many psychoanalysts working in our communities who challenge the prevailing psychoanalytic ideologies. To dismantle barriers, to see more, we must engage in difficult conversations and invest time in understanding ourselves as individuals and as community members."

Well-known psychoanalysts, such as **Daniel Jose Gaztambide**, **PsyD** (author of *A People's History of Psychoanalysis: From Freud to Liberation Psychology*), **Francisco González**, **MD**, **Kimberlyn Leary**, **PhD**, and **Paula Christian-Kliger**, **PhD**, provided a powerfully moving experience. We all walked away with a deeper understanding of group process and how to discern the intricate, complex, contextual, and ever-evolving dynamics of the social unconscious. We bore witness to the truth of how groups and individuals carry the collective traumas of generations of people, shaping the individual and socially-embedded selves, while showcasing the whole gamut of our human emotions.

Additionally, the third iteration of the 8-session CE course, Bridging Community & Psychoanalysis, was offered to the Oregon community and has been a huge success. The course aims to learn from experience by using group process to investigate more deeply the intersection between community and psychoanalysis. For anyone interested in taking this course in the future, please let us know so we can consider how and when to organize the fourth iteration.

Finally, GCAP mourns the loss of **Sandra Jenkins**, **PhD**, who advocated for any effort to extend the reach of psychoanalysis. It feels as though now, more than ever, we ought to remain open to how we can help our communities which continue to be ravaged by the consequences of human aggression.


Nancy Winters, MD, FIPA, has recently published:
