

Dear OPC Members and Friends,

The Oregon Psychoanalytic Center would like to acknowledge all the hardworking volunteers who, by volunteering your time, energy, and money, create a dynamic array of programs, courses, and education opportunities. We would not exist without your drive and dedication. At OPC's Annual Meeting held on May 5th, we reviewed statistics that are impressive and gratifying to hear. I would like to share some of those with you. For this academic year, we have 9 candidates in the Oregon Psychoanalytic Institute (OPI), 8 students in the Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy Program (PPP), and 381 attendees to our Continuing Education (CE) Program courses and events. Since the beginning of OPI in 1995, there have been 38 graduates. For the PPP, which started in 2007, there have been 46 graduates. And since our CE programs began in 2000, there have been 8507 attendees to date.

When considering these numbers, I think of the ripple effect OPC is having through its educational programs, its outreach efforts, and most of all, its impact on each of us and the lives and families of people we have the privilege of working with in our clinical, private, and community-based settings. Infused throughout this learning and growing are goals of openness and curiosity, of creating safety where free questioning and self-reflection develop, and of growth in our capacity to tolerate the uncertainties necessary for deeper work. It is these kinds of values that are needed to help those we work with, and ourselves, to become more fully who we are.

As we continue to learn from our experiences and expand our programs, another value that has become increasingly essential in this day and age of escalating polarities is seeking more awareness of our conscious and unconscious biases, including how they influence our teaching and clinical work. OPC is dedicated to this goal. There are lenses that are always operating through which we perceive and express our thoughts and feelings. We need to continually work on our awareness of these and help each other with this undertaking, too. Facing and confronting the inevitable misunderstandings and pain that are caused is of undeniable importance. Ingredients vital in this endeavor are respect, discipline, humility, and compassion. We welcome and are truly thankful for all who join us in this mission.

Message from Oregon Psychoanalytic Institute (OPI) Director

Our biggest news is that we're excited to start a new candidate cohort in the Fall of 2025. A warm welcome to **Aaron Garner, LCSW, Olivia Torres Sprauer, PsyD, Reid Zweifel, MD,** and perhaps more new candidates who are now in the process of applying. *Please see the new candidate bios on page 5.*

We've continued having rewarding in-person meetings as a faculty at OPI — **Jeanne Johnson, MD**, led another discussion on ethics, this time focusing on Jane Kite's paper, "The Fundamental Ethical Ambiguity of the Analyst as Person" (JAPA 2016). We hope to have a continuing series of discussion groups with a focus on analytic ethics as a way to develop a language about psychoanalytic ethics and a way of thinking about it together.

At our last faculty meeting of the year, **J. Powers, MD,** introduced us to what learning about Transference-Based Psychotherapy has meant to his development as an analyst, with Otto Kernberg's paper, "Extensions of Psychoanalytic Technique: The Mutual Influences of Standard Psychoanalysis and Transference-Focused Psychotherapy" (Psychodynamic Psychiatry, 2021).

Our second Conversations in Contemporary Psychoanalysis was held on May 22, with our reading and thinking about **Nancy Winters', MD,** prescient 2023 paper, 'A Home to the Lie': The Contemporary (Per)version of Truth" (American Journal of Psychoanalysis, 2023). These events, which are free to all candidates, PPP students, and faculty, and include free CE credits, will continue next year. OPC members are welcome to come, and there is a fee of \$20. Please keep an eye out for them and sign up on the OPC website.

Our Training Outreach Committee (the brainchild of Sara Gardiner, MD, now with chair Cody Evans, MD, at the helm, and committee members Sara Gardiner and Cindi Palman, MD) has been working tirelessly to provide graduate students a sense of how a psychoanalyst thinks and works. Among other events, they have organized a monthly case conference for OHSU residents, started a case conference for Pacific University psychology students, plan to start an interdisciplinary case conference in the fall, and are coordinating with other faculty in the PPP around George Fox and several other places where therapists learn and work. Their enthusiasm for our work and efforts to show others what we do, and to include so many of our faculty in this endeavor, have been impressive.

I hope to see many of you at the year-end celebration. It's always a treat to be able to see so many of you and to acknowledge the accomplishments of graduates, faculty, and administration. It will be more fun if you are there!

Continuing Education (CE)





Aaron Garner, MSW, LCSW

Aaron is a clinical social worker currently in private practice in San Antonio, Texas, where he sees adolescents and adults for psychodynamic psychotherapy. This spring he will move to Portland to establish a private practice and enter the firstyear class at OPI in September 2025. Though originally from Texas, Mr. Garner received his B.A. from Pacific University with a major in Political Science. Recent Member Accomplishments (in alphabetical order) Sara Gardiner, MD, has accepted invitations to become a member of the Editorial Board of the International Journal of Psychoanalysis, as well as an editorial reader for the Analyst at Work section in the International Journal of Psychoanalysis. Maya Klein, PhD, presented at the Family and Community Engagement Learning Network (FACE) Webinar Series on May 8, 2025. Her presentation, From Self to Selfie: How Social Media Shapes Childhood Development and Relationship Building, explored the developmental roots of self-focus, the impact of social media on relational growth, and how digital platforms can disrupt the transition from early narcissism to healthy, reciprocal relationships.
